Navigation Committee Report

David Podurgiel, Vice President, WAP, started by thanking COL Short for his good work while in Pittsburgh. David felt COL Short’s work in Pittsburgh had been positive especially relating to communication between the USACE and Industry.

Additionally, the following report was provided:

- Area Rivers have been fluctuating all month, no high-water events.
- NTNI and Priority Lockage Form were sent out to Industry for the upcoming Montgomery outage. The only change to the form was it must be submitted 36 hours prior to arrival. Information below.

Priority Lockage requests must be made 36 hours prior to arrival of tow. Request are based on life-sustaining needs, guidelines are listed below. As is past practice, request forms will be sent to me to be reviewed by the Waterways Association of Pittsburgh Navigation Committee.

- Home Heating Oil
- Public Health and Medical Services
- Petroleum (Gas/Diesel) for public consumption

Upcoming Lock outages and their impacts on Industry 2021

Braddock Lock 2 Mon Mile 11.2: July 26 @ 0600 thru Jul 28 @ 0600 This was not on the schedule, but it needs done. Brian McFarland from COE called to describe the work, the Navigation Committee requested that they start the work during the beginning of the Montgomery outage. During this outage, the contractor will be de-energizing the lock in order to complete final electrical work associated with the newly installed interlock controls thus shutting down both chambers for 48 hours. I reached out to those mostly impacted including USX. If they can shorten the outage, they will communicate that to Industry as soon as they can. This will be a total closure of both chambers for 48 hours.

Montgomery OR Mile 31: 7/26-8/24, Primary Chamber, major delays expected.

Braddock Lock 2 Mon Mile 11.2: 9/13-10/15, Primary Chamber for 3 weeks, significant delays expected.

Willow Island OR Mile 161: 10/1-31, Primary Chamber, delays expected.

Montgomery OR Mile 31: 10/18-12/17, Primary Chamber, major delays expected.

Legislative Committee Report

Shane Checkan, Board Member, WAP and Assistant Chair of the Legislative Committee provided the following Report:

FY22 APPROPRIATIONS PROCESS STATUS IN THE HOUSE

On Monday July 12th the House Appropriations subcommittee on Energy and Water Development (E&WD) approved the top-line funding for the COE FY 2022. The subcommittee passed a vote by voice, with the full House committee to mark up the bill on Friday, July 16th.

- Overall proposed funding for the Corps is \$8.66 billion, an increase of \$1.1 billion above FY21's appropriated level, and \$1.9 billion above the President's FY22 budget request.
- The Corps' Investigations account funding is \$155 million, \$2 million above the FY21 enacted level and \$49.2 million above the FY22 request.
- Funding for the Construction account is \$2.6 billion, an increase of \$799.4 million above FY22's budget request.
- Funding for Operations and Maintenance (O&M) is \$4.8 billion, an increase of \$967.3 million above FY21 and \$500 million above the Administration's request.
- Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund (HMTF) projects are proposed to receive an estimated \$2.05 billion, \$370 million above the FY21 enacted level and an increase of \$424.1 million above the Administration's request.
- The Subcommittee also approved the list of Community Project Funding (formerly known as earmarks) that included \$22.5 million in Construction funding for the Navigation and

Ecosystem Sustainability Program (NESP). The project funding was requested by Representatives Bustos (D-IL), Hinson (R-IA), Graves (R-MO), and Luetkemeyer (R-MO).

- The House did not yet release funding information for Inland Waterways Trust Fund Construction and Major Rehab projects.

Overall, the FY22 Senate Appropriations are dragging on at a much slower pace. The Subcommittee allocations are not yet set, nor have any markups of FY22 appropriations bill been scheduled on the Senate side.

Given where both sides are with the appropriations process, the WCI has advised us that they see virtually no chance the E&WD Appropriation bill will be enacted into law by September 30, 2021 (the end of the fiscal year). The WCI anticipates We anticipate that, again this year, Congress will enact a Continuing Resolution (CR) in late September that will fund the Corps (and the balance of the Federal government) at FY21 levels (with some exceptions) through the late Fall. Hopefully, there will be an agreement between the House, Senate and White House on an omnibus appropriations package for all FY22 appropriations bills (including the E&WD appropriations bill) at some point in the Fall – but it is too early to know for sure if, or when, that might happen.

Army Corp of Engineers

John P. Dilla of the USACE discussed the Montgomery Lock project is projected to take approximately 2 years to complete. Work being done is not just in the water but land construction as well. Completion is scheduled for 2023 and the priority is to have a main chamber that is more reliable. Construction scheduled during the October – December timeframe for Primary Chamber Gate Anchorage Repairs is painful but also necessary.

He also advised there is \$500K of additional funding “in-the-works” which would be used for maintenance programs.
